- II. Answer the following questions in two or three sentences. Each question carries two marks.
 (4 × 2 = 8)
 - **13.** What promise does the speaker in the poem, 'A Red Red Rose' give his love?
 - 14. How does the poet say in the poem, 'If you Forget Me' that he cannot stop loving his beloved?

- **15.** What is described as a 'trick' by the owner of the restaurant in the story, 'A Man' by Vaikom Muhammed Basheer? What made the narrator behave so?
- 16. What objections did Prokofy Osipitch raise to Zapiokin's speech?
- **III.** Answer the following questions in a paragraph of 60 words each. Each question carries **four** marks. $(4 \times 4 = 16)$
 - 17. Why does the poet attempt a sonnet on Time's best jewel? What miracle does he expect his sonnet will do?
 - 18. How does Sarojini Naidu glorify womanhood in her poem, 'Bangle Sellers'?
 - **19.** Why does llosa think that literature is not a luxury pastime?
 - **20.** How does Alice Walker connect horse breeding and abuse of black women in slavery?
- IV. Answer any four of the following questions in a paragraph of 80 words each. Each question carries five marks. (4 × 5 = 20)
 - 21. Attempt a paragraph on the element of satire as reflected in the story, 'The Orator' by Anton Chekhov.
 - **22.** How does the story, 'The Romance of a Busy Broker' portray the machine like existence of human beings in a capitalistic society?
 - 23. Attempt a character sketch of Rosemary Fell in the story, 'A Cup of Tea'.
 - **24.** Write a paragraph on the theme of the story, 'A Canary for One' by Ernest Hemingway.
 - **25.** Bring out the element of satire as revealed in the story, 'A Man' by Vaikom Muhammed Basheer.

- V. Answer the following questions in not less than 300 words. To the questions 26 and 27 write from the internal choices. Each question carries eight marks. (2 × 8 = 16)
 - **26.** What elements of Romantic poetry do you find in the poem, 'To the Cuckoo'? Attempt an essay considering the poem as a Romantic lyric.

(**Hints** : Choice of subject matter – common life – subjective feelings – role of nature – importance to emotions and feelings – beauty, innocence of childhood – poetic devices).

OR

The poem, 'Elegy for Jane' explores the impact of one human life on another, outside the context of family or romantic love. Prepare a critical review of the poem.

(**Hints** : Qualities of an elegy – deviation from the traditional lamentation – mood of the protagonist – images revealing the qualities of the deceased – loss – pensive mood – setting of the poem – pathetic fallacy – final reconciliation).

27. What are the characteristic features of A. G. Gardiner's essays reflected in his essay, 'On Saying Please'?

(**Hints** : Star like radiance – terseness – trivial themes – basic truth of life – choice of words – tone – anecdotes etc.).

OR

What makes the memoir 'Last Day at School' by Giovanni Mosca interesting to the readers? Attempt a critical appreciation of the memoir bringing out the salient features of his writings.

(**Hints** : Minimalist style – influence of Hemingway – simple sentences – conversations – details left out – imagination of the readers – implied meaning).

- VI. Answer the following questions in not less than 300 words. The question carries eight marks. (1 × 8 = 8)
 - **28.** Consider 'When Lincoln Came to Pittsburgh' as a radio play which employs voice, sound effects, music and silence in conveying emotion and meaning to dialogues.

(**Hints** : Features of a radio play – choice of the theme – age of main characters – importance of dialogues – offstage – voice over – suspense – interior and exterior setting – music – etc.).
