#### OR

(b) Prepare a critical analysis of Night Rain.

(**Hints :** Night Rain, a madwoman - a dear one with comforting words - witness to love, disease - the speaker too like the rain - to be analysed along with the use of imagery)

25. (a) Trace the transformation of Eliza Doolittle from a disrespected, timid and ignored cockney flower-girl, to a lady as depicted in <u>Pygmalion</u>.

(**Hints :** Eliza's language shocking - Higgins' observation : "this creature with her kerbstone English... will keep her in the gutter to the end of her days .... in three months I could pass that girl off as a duchess.... lady's maid or shop assistant" - Colonel's challenge-Higgins' efforts - Eliza's success)

### OR

(b) The salutary effect of learning imparted by Prof. Higgins and the improvement it brought about on Higgins and Eliza.

(**Hints :** Prof. Higgins, rude, no manners, incorrigible but like Eliza tremendously transformed for the better show, through Higgins and other upclass people reveals and ridicules their pruderies, hypocrisies and inconsistencies - Shaw's reforming zeal - Eliza, the flower-girl develops into a self-confident, independent girl who could pass off as a duchess).

26. (a) Attempt an analysis of <u>The Metamorphosis</u>:

(**Hints**: Metamorphosis of Gregor Samsa - absurd as in Ovid - Gregor's hard work - concern for the family, even after the transformation - alienation - Existentialist concepts - Pathetic end)

# OR

(b) The transformation of Gregor Samsa symbolises the change of the people around him. Discuss.

(**Hints :** Irrational and absurd turn of events - Gregor's incapacity to function as the earning member - apathy of the family - even Grete moves to resentment - need turns all into earning members - family's self - reliance hastens Gregor's death).

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
